FICTION: REALISTIC

DEUKER, CARL. *NIGHT HOOPS.* While trying to prove that he is good enough to be on his high school's varsity basketball team, Nick must also deal with his parents' divorce and the erratic behavior of a troubled classmate who lives across the street.

HINTON, S.E. - THAT WAS THEN, THIS IS NOW.
Sixteen-year-olds Mark and Bryon have been like brothers since childhood. As their involvement with girls, gangs, and drugs increases, their relationship seems to gradually disintegrate.

LUBAR, DAVID — SLEEPING FRESHMEN NEVER LIE. Scott, a ninth-grader, keeps a hilarious diary with a list of "do's" and "don'ts" for surviving freshman year in hopes of helping his unborn sibling.

MASS, WENDY - A MANGO-SHAPED SPACE.

Thirteen-year-old Mia has kept a secret since third grade. She can see colors in numbers, music and spoken words. When she starts to fail math in eighth grade, she realizes she must seek help. Will her family and friends understand?

Na, AN - A STEP FROM HEAVEN. A young Korean girl and her family find it hard to adjust to life in America.

PHILBRICK, RODMAN - FREAK THE MIGHTY. Max, a large eighth-grader with a learning disability, becomes friends with Freak, an intelligent boy who is physically impaired.

SONES, SONYA - WHAT MY MOTHER DOESN'T KNOW. Through poetry, Sophie describes her relationships with a series of boys as she searches for Mr. Right.

VAN DRAANEN, WENDELIN - RUNNING DREAM. Jessica loses her leg in a car accident. All her friends turn her back on her except a girl with cerebral palsy. Will she be able to run track again, and learn the meaning of true friendship?

CLASSIC

AUSTEN, JANE - EMMA. Emma devotes her formidable energies to matchmaking between friends and acquaintances in the village of Highbury. The plot turns on a romance of which she is wholly unaware.

STOKER, BRAM - DRACULA. From accounts in news clippings to his personal diaries, Count Dracula travels from Transylvania to London in search of new victims.

BRUCHAC, JOSEPH — CODE TALKER. Sixteen-year-old Ned lies about his age, joins the Marines, and becomes a code talker. Using his secret Navajo language, he helps his country end the war against Japan.

OTSUKA, JULIE - WHEN THE EMPEROR WAS DIVINE. Five members of a Japanese American family present their unique perspectives of being forced into an internment camp during World War II.

SCHMIDT, GARY — THE WEDNESDAY WARS. In 1967, Holling Hoodhood starts seventh grade and experiences a series of mishaps and adventures involving cream puffs, yellow tights, Shakespeare and the New York Yankees.

MYSTERY & ADVENTURE

CARTER, ALLY — *HEIST SOCIETY.* Teen Kat Bishop is tired of her family's life of crime, so she enrolls in the top boarding school. When her father gets blamed for stealing a mobster's art, she must steal back the paintings to save her father's life.

DU MAURIER, DAPHNE - REBECCA. For months after her death, the memory of Rebecca de Winter continues to dominate everyone at her former home, Manderley, a famous English country house.

LANE, ANDREW — DEATH CLOUD (*SERIES). Sherlock Holmes' legend begins at the age of 14 when visiting his aunt and uncle; two neighbors die of a mysterious plague. Sherlock and his tutor Amos find out the real deadly reason behind this deadly disease.

YANCEY, RICK — THE EXTRAORDINARY ADVENTURES OF ALFRED KROPP. When teenager Alfred Kropp accidentally rescues King Arthur's legendary Excalibur, he begins a dangerous mission to keep the sword safe from the forces of evil.

SCIENCE-FICTION & FANTASY

ADAMS, DOUGLAS - THE HITCHHIKER'S GUIDE TO THE GALAXY. Seconds before Earth is demolished to make room for a galactic freeway, an earthman is saved by his friend. Together they journey through the galaxy.

SUMMER READING LIST

CARD. ORSON SCOTT - ENDER'S GAME.

In order to develop a secure defense against a hostile alien race's next attack, government agencies breed child geniuses and train them as soldiers.

CRICHTON, MICHAEL - ANDROMEDA STRAIN. For five days, American scientists struggle to identify and control a deadly new form of life.

FARMER, NANCY - THE HOUSE OF THE SCORPION. In a future where humans despise clones, Matt enjoys special status as the young clone of El Patron, the 142-year-old leader of a corrupt drug empire nestled between Mexico and the United States.

GILBERT MURDOCK, CATHERINE PRINCESS BEN. When her parents are
assassinated, Queen Sofia locks tomboy "Ben" in a
room to train her to be royal "Princess
Benevolence". Barricaded and starving, she finds
a hidden door and learns magic. With her kingdom
under threat, can she escape and use her new
powers to save her people?

WESTERFELD, SCOTT - UGLIES. Growing up in a futuristic world, 15-year-old Tally, a fun-loving trickster, attracts the attention of the secret police when she begins to question the society she lives in and break the rules.

Non-Fiction: Biography & Autobiography

DAVIS, SAMPSON — WE BEAT THE STREET.
Growing up in Jersey, Rameck, George, and Sampson decide to avoid the fate of many of their friends' lives of drug dealing, gangs, and prison, by making a pact to go to medical school.

HOOSE, PHILIP - CLAUDETTE COLVIN: TWICE TOWARD JUSTICE. Nine months before Rosa Parks, 15-year-old Claudette Colvin is the first to trigger a bus boycott. She was a key plaintiff in ending Montgomery's segregated bus system. Read about this brave teenager's courageous life story.

SPIEGELMAN, ART - MAUS I. A story of a Jewish survivor of Hitler's Europe and his son, a cartoonist who tries to come to terms with his father's story and history itself.
