about the book

Heather McGhee's specialty is the American economy and the mystery of why it so often fails the American public. This is the story of how public goods in this



country have become private luxuries; of how unions collapsed, wages stagnated, and inequality increased; and of how this country, unique among the world's advanced economies, has thwarted universal healthcare. But in unlikely places of worship and work, McGhee finds proof of what she calls the Solidarity Dividend: gains that come when people come together across race, to accomplish what we simply can't do on our own.

The Sum of Us: What Racism Costs Everyone and How We Can Prosper Together is a brilliant analysis of how we arrived here: divided and self-destructing, materially rich but spiritually starved and vastly unequal. McGhee marshals economic and sociological research to paint an irrefutable story of racism's costs, but at the heart of the book are the humble stories of people yearning to be part of a better America, including white supremacy's collateral victims: white people themselves. With startling empathy, this heartfelt message from a Black woman to a multiracial America leaves us with a new vision for a future in which we finally realize that life can be more than zero-sum.

Heather McGhee was born in 1980 and raised on the south side of Chicago by her mother, Gail Christopher, a highly regarded social justice and social change agent. At age 11, she was sent to a middle grade boarding school in western Massachusetts and subsequently went on to

attend high school at Milton Academy. Moving from urban to rural, from mostly Black and diverse to completely white, from large class sizes at public schools to small class sizes at private institutions—with incredible amounts of resources—was a life-changing decision. Heather went on to receive a B.A in American Studies from Yale University and a J.D. from the University of California at Berkeley School of Law.

Over her career in public policy, she has crafted legislation, testified before Congress, and helped shape presidential campaign platforms. Heather designs and promotes solutions to inequality in America. McGhee is an educator who is currently serving as a Visiting Lecturer in Urban Studies at the City University of New York's School of Labor and Urban Studies. She also chairs the board of Color of Change, the nation's largest online racial justice organization. Her first book, *The Sum of Us: What Racism Costs Everyone and How We Can Prosper Together*, spent 10 weeks on the *New York Times* bestseller list and was longlisted for the National Book Award and Carnegie Medal for Excellence in Nonfiction.

Heather McGhee resides in Brooklyn, New York with her husband and daughter.



Wilkerson examines common underlying pillars, such as bloodlines and stigma, that seek to oppress groups of people to the detriment of their health and society. She then offers ways to move forward past these destructive systems to a more hopeful future.




Stamped From the Beginning: A Definitive History of Race in America

In a comprehensive history of anti-Black racism, Kendi highlights key historical figures who shaped America's view of race in addition to differentiating between assimilationists, segregationists, racists, and anti-racists. Through thoughtful research and analysis, Kendi illustrates how racist thinking stems not from a place

of ignorance, but from an intentional desire to propel and rationalize discriminatory policies that benefit certain groups of people. Kendi conveys how to deconstruct and debunk these ideas to create a society that is purposefully anti-racist.



Dying of Whiteness: How the Politics of Racial Resentment Is Killing America's Heartland By Jonathan Metzl

Physician Jonathan Metzl takes a cross-country journey through America's heartland to understand how rightwing backlash policies have severe health consequences, even for the white voters they purport to help. These policies promising to make America great actually lower white life expectancies, soar gun suicides, and elevate school

dropout rates. Metzl demonstrates that white America would benefit most from cooperation – not from propaganda and promises about supremacy.
